- The Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) agreement introduced at this year's events has been finalised by the Programme and will be distributed to all participants in the coming weeks.
- The Radiology QI Programme has decided to submit an application to the National Clinical Effectiveness Committee for National Clinical Audit status as set out in the forthcoming Health Information and Patient Safety Bill.

The aim of this bulletin is to provide some detail on each of these developments and inform programme participants on what to expect as we move into this new phase. The MOU and measures to secure Legal

Protection for QI Activities are part of the embedding and rollout of the RQI programme at a national level.

As noted in a recent Faculty email, from the Dean to all QI Leads, the National Clinical Audit application will require the support of all programme participants.

Faculty of Radiologists Message

The Faculty of Radiologists emphasises the value of the programme to patient safety.





We encourage radiologists to balance any risks perceived from the FOI Act against the risks of not being involved in the National Radiology QI Programme.

The data captured in peerVue and transmitted to NQAIS will help us achieve National Clinical Audit status and gain legal protection for all of our participants.

Support for the National Clinical Audit project

The Radiology QI Programme has been selected as the second submission to be accepted by the National Clinical Effectiveness Committee (NCEC) for screening for National Clinical Audit. This is a fantastic opportunity and key step towards gaining legal protection for QI Data.

The securing of legal protection for QI Activities is a key component of implementing a successful national programme.



There is a concerted effort going on within the QI Programme to get the work done required for the NCA status, but without commitment from participant hospitals, to provide the national data required for a national audit, we will fail.

It is imperative we now get commitment from all hospitals, from management through to radiologists.

Getting the MOUs signed with the requirements fulfilled is essential.



National Clinical Audit

The Faculty of Radiologists have been successful in pushing the Radiology QI Programme to the top of the NCEC agenda to ensure that the Programme will have the National Clinical Audit status in place for the commencement of the Health Information and Patient Safety (HIPS) Bill.



Protection from legal discovery through Freedom Of Information Acts, for QI Activity data, recommended in the Report of the Commission on Patient Safety and Quality Assurance in 2008, has long been called for by the Radiology QI Programme.

It will finally be afforded by the upcoming HIPS Bill; expected mid 2017.

The route for programmes to secure this protection is by Ministerial endorsement as National Clinical Audit on the recommendation of the National Clinical Effectiveness Committee (NCEC).

The QI Programme is now preparing an application to the NCEC to a very tight timeline.

Requirements of Submission for National Clinical Audit

The NCEC have outlined a framework through which programmes applying for "National Clinical Audit" status will be assessed. National Clinical Audit (NCA) requires national measurement against standards (targets):

- Targets must be developed for the programme to be endorsed as NCA
- Data must exist in the system for there to be measurement.

The Progamme is now working on setting targets for key quality areas outlined in the QI Guidelines and displayed in NQASI-Radiology.

These targets will be appropriate for the early phase of the programme, given the recent launch of NQAIS-Radiology, and will reflect the emphasis on improvement in the programme rather than setting unreasonable standards.

Targets will facilitate commentary by the QI Programme on the national aggregate performance in Annual Data Reports, and will allow participants to easily determine what areas their departments need to focus on.



By the time of application submission to the NCEC, the QI Programme will need to have notably improved participation rates and we expect to see this improvement following receipt of the instructions set out in the MOU.

Memorandum of Understanding

The Radiology Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) will be sent to all hospital CEOs and Radiology departments in the next two weeks.

Histopathology issued an MOU in 2014 and has received signed copies from all hospitals. The Endoscopy QI Programme will be issuing MOUs at the same time as Radiology.


The central purpose of the MOU is to formally set out the roles and responsibilities of all programme stakeholders.

Participation Requirements

- 1) recording of QI data electronically (Radiologists)
- uploading Summary Data quarterly (QI Lead Radiologist)
- reviewing KQI statistics in NQAIS-Radiology quarterly (QI Lead Radiologist)
- 4) taking action where appropriate (QI Lead Radiologist and Clinical Director)

The Faculty of Radiologists recognize the time involved will have an impact on the time of both the QI Lead Radiologist and all radiologists in the department.

Therefore, the MOU will be for a period of one year and a review of the MOU will follow an audit of participant experience.
